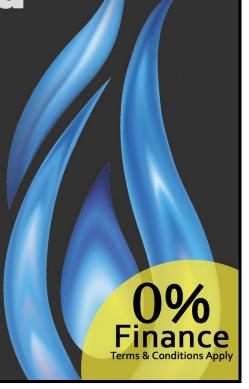

Perhaps a new form of social media will emerge, where we actually talk to each other rather than just post a photo or a comment!

A rise in localism and greater self-sufficiency might be another consequence. We are fortunate in the village to have a large number of allotments where we can grow our own produce. Zoe Cox gives us another fascinating insight into her experiences that we are sure will be inspirational for many looking to grow their own. Allotments remain available!



# Parish Council update

• Centenary Field - The field is still under the ownership and responsibility of Croudace Homes. The Parish Council provided the developer in December 2019 with a list of issues that need resolving prior to handover and received no proper response. At the Beginning of March 2020, the Parish Council formally wrote to the developer asking for their proposed resolutions to the issues within a given timescale however, understandably, a response has been delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. At the time of writing this article the Regional Managing

- Director of Croudace Homes has confirmed that the Parish Clerk will be contacted by the developer's representative prior to the Parish council meeting on 8<sup>th</sup> June.
- So, when will Centenary Field be open for use? As soon as we can get a resolution to the issues raised that does not put the burden of repair or maintenance costs onto the Council and our residents.
- Are the Parish Council still planning enhancement of facilities on Centenary Field? Yes, we are planning to install additional play equipment, an outdoor gym and signage and benches in the coming 12 to 18 months. Planning for this has been delayed due to COVID-19 but more on this in the months to come.
- Wry Close Allotments Enhancements to the water supply, fencing and site amenities are planned for this year. Plots are still available to rent so please do contact us if you would like to try a little gardening.
- **Old Road Meadow** The metal table and bench have been repainted to remove offensive graffiti. Additional signage, another table and bench and perhaps more play equipment will be installed her in the coming 12 to 18 months.
- Parish council meetings These are now being held via video link. Members of the public are always welcome to participate so please do look out for our meeting agendas on <a href="https://www.meppershall.org">www.meppershall.org</a> for joining instructions.

# Central Bedfordshire Council and COVID-19: Preserving life, supporting the vulnerable and protecting livelihoods

#### **Community Hub**

Our Community Hub continues to be a lifeline for those without anyone to support them during isolation by arranging emergency food parcels, which are enough to see someone through a few days while longer term support is arranged. To date we have sent out 1,168 emergency food parcels, feeding 1,529 people. We have received new data showing an additional 585 residents who are shielding. Of the 12,580 residents who are required to shield, 9,419 have been proactively contacted. We continue to work with our network of volunteers across the area who can help vulnerable residents who don't have any other support on a longer-term basis with weekly shopping, collecting prescriptions and 'check in and chat' calls. So far we've referred 2,596 people to them, of these 1,461 are for ongoing support with food and prescriptions, 1,078 are for befriending calls and 57 are being supported by Citizens

Advice. Thank you to those Members who have undertaken door knocking to check on our vulnerable residents who we haven't been able to contact by any other means. We would welcome support from any Members who would be willing to assist with door knocking in their own or other wards local to their area. Email committeemeetings@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk if you are able to help.

#### Local welfare provision

We had 458 new Universal Credit notifications from claimants requesting assistance with their Council tax payments this week. We also received 158 new claims from residents under the Local Council Tax Support scheme. This was a 36% increase on the previous week and around twice what we would normally receive in a week.

## **Business Support Grants**

We received 300 applications again this week thanks to our proactive calls to businesses, voluntary organisations and charities who had not yet applied. The Revenues and Benefits team has paid out grants to 2,822 businesses out of 3,755 applications. This is 75% of all claims. We have rejected over 500 applications from ineligible businesses or duplicate ones, avoiding a potential loss to CBC of up to £6m.

Those aware of anyone in their community who is vulnerable and doesn't have anyone else to help them can contact the Council. Referrals should be made through the website at www.centralbedfordshire.gov.uk/covidhelp or by calling our helpline 0300 300 8900. It is really important that referrals for support are made through the website or helpline so they can processed without delay.

# A Message From CBC Councillors Mark Liddiard and Tony Brown

We are very proud to represent such a friendly community where, despite very hectic lives coming to a halt, many residents have set up communication and help schemes to support those residents who are isolating - enabling them to access help and support. Having cycled and walked most of the ward during the last 6 weeks it has also been great to see residents "meeting up" (under the current social distancing guidance) for a cup of tea between neighbouring gardens. We are pleased to see so many residents and their families out walking on footpaths and bridleways. A number of residents have confessed that they did not realise what is actually on their doorstep.

Sadly the ward has not escaped COVID-19 and whilst we wait for some robust figures, we know that some residents have sadly passed away and our thoughts go out to their loved ones and their families in these difficult times.

We are very pleased that our Highways team have been taking advantage of the reduced traffic to re-surface roads and footpaths and I can confirm that Tony and myself have had quite a few 'Teams' calls with Officers over various highways issues around the village. To put it into some context, both Tony and myself fight tooth and nail for improvements. Sadly the budget available does not allow for our wish-list to be fulfilled but we do lobby hard for every penny. Please see a list below which might be of interest to residents:

- The Fildyke Road footpath is now complete
- Fildyke Road will be re-surfaced in 2 sections Sugar Loaf to 84 Fildyke Road first and then 84 to Chapel Road - once a number of smaller residential sites are completed. We had hoped to complete the works in one go but Paul Middleton, Highways Assets Manager who we met on site, advised against it as it is very hard to get developers to rectify any subsequent damage caused and we want to ensure that the road lasts.
- We have asked that the 'Dragons Teeth' on entering the village on Shefford Road and traffic calming measures on Shillington Road be re-marked.
- A section of footpath is planned to be replaced in Orchard Close during the summer (plan available).
- Following communications with the Parish Council and residents we have asked for a footpath and road inspection at Brookside and Hoo Road. Depending on Officers' guidance we will push for them to be replaced in future capital plans.
- We have noticed that a number of potholes have recently been filled along Shefford Road but these keep re-appearing in different places. We know that two or three residents regularly contact the Council via our Highways Portal to report them. As there are two major residential sites to be built out for 64 and 150 houses along this road, along with plans for traffic calming measures around the entrances, we have asked Officers to keep on top of surface wear issues and potholes: our longer term intention is to get Shefford Road re-surfaced once the developments have been built out.

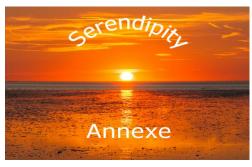

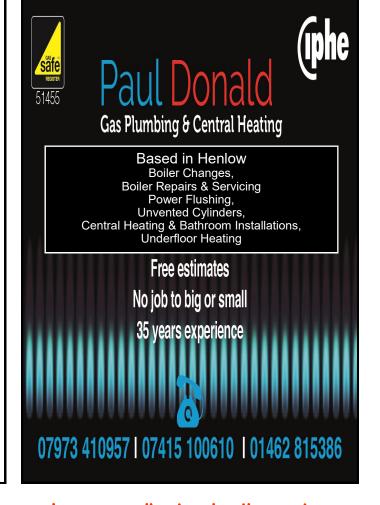

### Message from St Mary's

"How are you? No, how are you really?" During the lockdown, this has been the theme of a particular advert on television. It reminds me that now, more than ever, we are conscious of the wellbeing of others. As naturally reserved British people, we have started to ask that question "How are you really?"

If you are like me then, during this lockdown, you will have had good days as well as days of worry and anxiety and not least a little frustration. Through it all, it has been those moments of connection with others from outside our household that have been most encouraging. People have commented that Meppershall has often shown its best side during this period – clapping from our doorsteps each Thursday, stopping to speak to anyone we meet on our walks (at a social distance) and of course the response of so many during the recent VE day commemorations.

These moments offer a little glimpse of normality as we connect with the world outside. A chance to show our concern, love and appreciation to others in this difficult time. We have also had time to listen to others as we speak from our doorsteps, on the phone or via Zoom. I have made some doorstep visits to some who I know are living on their own during this lock down and talking on their doorsteps. I have found out so much about their earlier lives and it is humbling to realise that we have so many people in Meppershall who have had such incredible and inspiring lives. One day this lockdown will be over and when we enter 'the new normal' let's not lose the ability to stop and ask the question "How are you, really?" Let's continue to value others and continue to care and show an interest in their lives.

As I am writing, I am looking at the bible reading set for this coming Sunday - it is the story of Noah and the Ark. It struck me that the bible's account of the flood also summarised the current situation in so many ways. Noah built the Ark and went into lockdown to ensure the safety of his household. Noah was surrounded by wildlife of every type – this reminded me that in lockdown we too have been surrounded by nature. I have seen and heard so many different types of birds (is it me, or is the birdsong louder than before?) Returning from shopping, I had to stop the car on the

empty A507 to allow a beautiful peacock\* to make its way slowly across to the other side. Finally, I saw two large hares playing in the fields with no concern for the humans watching them!

Like us, Noah and his family are desperate for their lockdown to end. They sent a raven and a dove to check if it was safe to leave the Ark. Finally, they leave the safety of the Ark to return to a more normal life Noah sees a rainbow the sign of God's comfort and protection. That same rainbow image can be seen in so many of our windows. It continues to bring comfort and a message of hope.

As we move forward towards our 'new normal' let us give thanks for those around us and, let's continue to see the beauty of nature around us, and let's keep talking and listening to each other.

# The Meppershall Players at S.T.M.A. As it is now June and the Players are still resting (as is most of the world) I thought I would share with you a little of the Players' history...



A drama group was started in Meppershall in about 1955 and was known as The Meppershall Amateur Dramatic Society (MADS for short). Rehearsals were held in the then Village Hall, a wooden building which stood opposite the Five Bells public house (demolished in the 1970's and Taylors Close erected). Anyone wanting to use the hall collected the key from the pub. The hall didn't have a stage so performances were put on at Stondon Village Hall and Robert Bloomfield School hall.

When fundraising started for a new Village Hall (the one which use to sit on the High Street and was demolished in 2017). No provision had been made for a stage in the original plans and apparently it took some time for members of the MADS to convince the Hall Committee at the time that a stage would be an asset to the hall and village. Thankfully, the Hall Committee obviously thought so too.

Jessie Niven, a former member of the MADS (sadly no longer with us), wrote down some of her recollections of these early days, in her own words, as follows:

"The MADS also put on some variety shows. One I remember "Variety 64" included a 25 minute Irish sketch called "A Pot of Broth". I was to sit plucking a chicken and a tramp was to call and give me a lot of blarney to get me out of the way so that he could steal the chicken. However, the young lad who was to play the tramp failed to turn up-I think he got cold feet. So the Stage-Manager asked me if I would go on if he did the part.

Thinking he must know the play pretty well I said yes. How wrong I was; He didn't know the part at all and just made it up all the time. Instead of <u>asking questions</u> as I was supposed to I <u>told</u> him things. He had the chicken off me and into the cooking pot feathers as well in five minutes flat and the whole sketch was over in what was for me ten terrifying minutes"

The Stage-Manager was Barrie Carne, my Dad. (No need to wonder where my brother Paul, myself and my son Tom got our love of Am-Dram from).

As so often happens with drama groups, members move away, work away and MADS sadly folded leaving Meppershall without a drama group for a few years. In the early 1970's a new resident of Meppershall, Terry de Boo, arranged a meeting with Bill Wright a former member of MADS and Jessie to see if the drama group could start up again. A one act play was put on together with a wine and cheese evening to gauge interest in a drama group. It must have been sufficient as a committee was elected and a new name decided upon.

Their first production was Spring and Port Wine In 1972. Jessie played the Mum, Bill the Dad, and a very young Paul (Carne) played the youngest son "The Meppershall Players" was born.



# Finance: the 3 questions you should ask yourself when markets fall by Paul Savuto



Or did you remain patient and wait for prices to recover – which they did from around 2015? When you think about how you'd react if your house price fell, it's true that financial markets are the only place that you would ever consider selling at a discount and buying at a premium.

"It's just that I have done a few of these exit meetings and it seems everyone joins young and leaves..." he trails off, realising it wouldn't be right to call this woman "old."

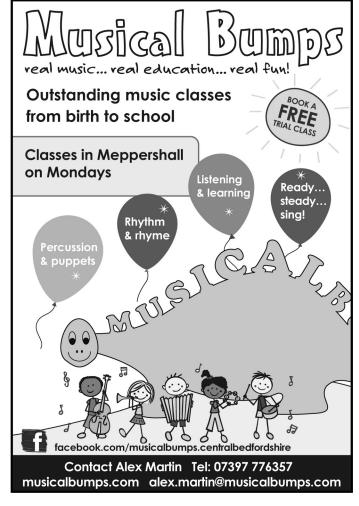



# Diary of an Allotment by Zoe Cox

Thank you to everyone who gave me positive feedback about my article in last month's Messenger and requested updates on the ramblings of an allotment holder.

As I write this, the 2 big questions for the allotment are will it rain, and will there be frost? Rain is good, frost is not.

Rain means a welcome break from watering and a relief to have the ground properly wet. April showers not only give us May flowers but also May vegetables. The few days of rain at the end of April were very much wanted. It also makes the remaining bits of digging much easier.

Frost is very much unwelcome at this time of the year as it means a frantic dash to get everything protected so that this year's dreams and ambitions of a plentiful harvest are not dashed on the cruel rocks of eagerness.

Every year there is much discussion and decision-making about when to bring everything from the greenhouse and plant it out. The key we have found over the years is to be patient and every year we ignore this advice. One day wisdom will trump eagerness, but not this year.

Normally I have no problem with germinating plants. This year the plants are struggling and I am beginning to think they don't welcome my extra attention and maybe my usual neglect needs to be reinstated. Only one variety of tomato germinated and the squashes/pumpkins are not in any mood to make an appearance.

The greenhouse space is running out fast as tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers need to be planted into their final positions. So we started to harden off the plants going to the allotment by putting them outside during the day which gets them used to the outside temperatures and winds. These were grown and nurtured from seed over several months so it is very important to do this stage properly or the walk of doom to the compost heap will beckon. This year is especially important as the fallback of going to the garden centre and filling in with professionally grown things is not an option.

The other fallback of plant swapping between plot holders is also on hold as we are keen to keep physical distancing.



We played chicken with the weather and planted out our sweetcorn, runner beans and courgettes 2 weeks earlier than sensible people would do so. The following 2 weeks is full of nervousness over a frosty snap. We did try to cover the courgettes with plastic but our protective cover wanted to self identify as a trampoline in a hurricane and kept blowing off into the furthest corner of the allotment field so we gave up as we had no desire to identify ourselves as fly tippers. We shall see whether we come to regret such rash action but this is a month of no issues, no pests and diseases (still too cold) and no drought (too early) so there is a sense of optimism amongst the allotment holders that this is year we shall feast.

The frantic work of the spring is nearly over and as we go into the next month we need to keep on top of the weeding – more on that in another issue. For now we can start eating the lettuce we planted in a tub a few weeks ago and look forward to other produce to make us get in touch with our inner Good Life Tom and Barbara!

sized allotments available to rent, located at Wry Close (in the centre of Meppershall behind the Sugar Loaf public house). The annual cost depends on the size, but at present is between £15 to £40 with a 50% discount for anyone taking up a plot for the rest of this rent year (finishes end September). Water is currently free but note that there are no toilets on site!



## Meppershall Police House – A Letter From History

The Meppershall Messenger was recently passed a copy of a 2004 letter which described what it was like to live in the police house and work in the village as the village constable back in 1959. The police house can be seen on the east side of Shefford Road and the letter was a way for a previous occupant, Robert Park, to share some memories with its current owner, Richard Ivory. Richard has kindly allowed us to share some of the interesting insights in the letter, here.

PC Park occupied the house in the long, hot months of the summer of 1959 when a drought struck the UK. Using only a heavy upright bicycle to move around the area, the 'village bobby' worked with colleagues in neighbouring villages who would often help with investigations and prosecutions if they involved close neighbours — each officer was very much embedded in the community.

The house had a small police office attached but most people would come straight to the front door. The village policeman was on call constantly with just an old-style Bakelite telephone to connect him with the Divisional HQ at Biggleswade or County HQ at Bedford. To leave the village, the officer had to request permission from County HQ, even to go shopping. Working hours varied greatly but typically involved 12 days every fortnight and 4 hours in every 12. The wage of £8 per week was collected by each officer, in person, in full uniform, from Biggleswade and could be supplemented by a payment of 3 (old) pence for submission of each typed report. There was no overtime payment and policemen's wives were not allowed to work but were expected to assist in the temporary absence of their husband when necessary.



The village policeman lived in the police house without paying rent but relied on the Local Authority for decoration and maintenance (officers were not allowed to do these things themselves). There was no central heating, no double glazing and furniture, curtains and carpets etc were the responsibility of the officer. Exterior appearances

were expected to be kept high, including the garden and borders. On first coming to Meppershall, PC Park's family lived upstairs while extensive dry rot was made good downstairs. Work and homelife happened side-by-side, with the phone on a stand-up desk in the hallway where much of the administration was done and where members of the public would visit, alongside the family sitting area, dining room and kitchen.

In 1959, as well as an outside loo and septic tank, the garden included a water well with hand-pump and a garage used as a garden shed. On a police constable's wages, few officers were able to keep and run a vehicle. Over the years, successive officers cultivated a productive garden with a big tulip patch, gooseberry bushes and at times the keeping of hens (a previous officer named Walker had 24 hens) as well as pigs. In this rural setting, the hedge along Shefford Road was a well-established field hedge.



To the left of the police house were some council houses and PC Park remembers the Dilley family who lived there, with their liking for Woodbines. Open fields spread around the house to the right and across the road, with the farm of Bogey Knight a little further up the road. The Knights also ran the post office and grocery store and occasionally helped out by running a tractor around the police house back garden, which at times could become a little unkempt.

Once, on mowing the lengthening grass, a partridge nest was revealed, full of eggs. Animals were part of daily life in Meppershall. Lost or stray farm animals would often be returned to the police house for safe-keeping – surprising the returning police officer as they came across an untied animal feasting on the contents of the garden! Officers also had a duty as assistant inspector for diseases of animals. In Meppershall, PC Park recalled coming across swine fever as well as a case of foul pest, but having grown up in the back streets of Glasgow these were not things he was very used to!

There were happy and sometimes less happy times in village policing. A frequent visitor for a cuppa was the village milkman who, with partner Mary, were remembered as a very nice couple. They were unmarried and such relationships were, sadly, still frowned on in those days. The Barley Mow pub stood further up the road from the Knights' farm. It was the scene of a tragedy when one of the Knight brothers took his

own life in a barn on that site. Also in 1959, fire struck the Manor House beside the church, destroying a unique and historic staircase and causing significant damage. PC Park recalls the wife of the manor house couple passing away at around that time.

Another tragedy was to befall PC Park's successor when he intervened at a well-known local gathering point for regulars spilling out of a Shefford pub at the earlier closing times of 10pm and 10.30pm which were in force back then. This boisterous after-hours throng had become an increasing nuisance in 1959 and when the new village constable attended to move them on he was stabbed, sustaining a paralysing injury.

PC Park recalled fondly the Yorkshireman at Stondon Manor, Mr Parrish, who was one of the first farmers to embark on the so-called battery farming of chickens. On the opposite side of the road in Stondon lived Alan Lennox Boyd, The Right Honourable The Viscount Boyd of Merton, who was married to Lady Patricia Guinness. Viscount Boyd was MP for Mid Bedfordshire and Minister of Transport and Aviation in Churchill's post-war government. He became Minister of State for the Colonies (what we would today call the Foreign Secretary) under the governments of Eden and Macmillan. Our locality had some very notable connections.

Thank you to Richard for sharing the letter and allowing us to include some of its details. PC Park commented that he had many fascinating experiences and could easily write a James-Herriott-style comedy based on his short stint in Meppershall and the many anecdotes he acquired at that time!

## My Memories of World War II by Enid Pamment

Although born in Hammersmith, London my parents moved to Kenton near Harrow where they were building new houses; that was in 1936. My father was a senior sheet metal worker and was working building frames for cars and coaches down the Edgware Road, near Hendon.

War started in 1939 and although my father was eligible for the armed forces he was transferred from the car industry to Dehavilland Aircraft in Hatfield completing several years of night work. Food went on ration and we all had 'fair share cards' Mum sent me to the local shops on my 3-wheeler bike to see what I could get! We also had clothing coupons.

My parents decided. My sister Brenda was several years older than me and had just been given the opportunity to complete a course in ladies' tailoring in Kilburn, North London. We would take our chance and all 'stick together' as a family.

When it came to me starting school, it was held three mornings a week in people's houses as the school I should have gone to was taken initially over by the ARP. Air raid shelters were brick-built and located in the side roads. This is during the early part of the war and when there were raids we had heavy bombing because the German aircraft were making their way towards Stanmore where there was an American Base and heavy artillery. By 1941 our house had all the front windows blown out and all

Mum's net curtains were blowing out of the windows, ripped. I can remember Mum in the front garden starting to cry – which now I can fully understand.

During this time we had experienced a bad raid which meant we did not get much sleep, so in the morning Mum sent me off to school. But when I was nearing the school, some of my pals told me to 'go home' as there was still an air raid on. I ran all the way home and of course Mum had not expected me and I couldn't stop to tell her as I was in need of the toilet upstairs! Then there was a mighty explosion and Mum ran upstairs to see if I was OK. She just started to laugh as I was sitting on the loo, head in hands with the toilet ceiling on my head!

Later in the war we had an unexploded doodlebug bomb fall at the back of our house. Dad was at work but we all had to get out of our house and move in with neighbours at the other end of the road. The next day we were sent to a library which had been taken over as a rest centre. From here we were given a house that was empty and the WRP brought in china and cutlery for us to eat with. We were there until the bomb disposal people came to get rid of the bomb.

Shortly after this incident, my sister and I (we had a double bed in the back of the house) were rudely awoken by another explosion. It was a good thing that I shot under the covers as I had to stay there until the glass from the window was removed from my bed. It was caused by a V-1, which was followed by the V-2 rocket. My parents felt I should be sent away as it had made me very nervous. Fortunately shortly after this we were informed that World War II was over! But although life became calm, rationing was still in force and we will still had to ration for coal! *Enid Pamment* 

## Walking Opportunities by James Read (Second Sunday Strollers)

It has been weeks. You have been using your daily outing to explore every corner of the village. You can't face that same old walk! You need something different.! Maybe this helps: the six main ways out of the village and into new landscapes and places. Find more info on FB @MeppershallStrollers. Even in our modest local landscape, you can get quite remote quite quickly – so stay safe and go equipped. Most importantly, respect the farming that is going on around us by keeping dogs under control, following signs and *leaving everything as you find it*.

### 1. Shillington Bury

Leave Meppershall at the Rectory, keep the hedge west of the Manor House on your left, continue through the opening in the hedge-line ahead of you and bear slightly right and through another two hedge-lines for huge views of Shillington, the Chilterns and the path to Shillington Bury. Shillington and Lower Gravenhurst are just beyond.

### 2. Cow Bridge

Again leaving along the north-west hedge around the Manor House, but turning right to keep the big field on your right hand, head out and gently down to waymarkers at the small wooden footway over the ditch. Cross the ditch and continue down, reaching a small wood (and the ditch) on your right and at the bottom venture through

the hedge to access the field across which sits the Cow Bridge. Upper Gravenhurst sits on the hill ahead, with Cainhoe and Clophill beyond.

## 3. Chibley Farm and beyond

Chibley Farm sits a mile outside the south end of the village in the direction of Pirton

and Shillington. Walk to it by the path on the east side of the watertower (over fields) or on the paths left off the hill down to Shillington from the main road. picture shows the view of Chibley Farm looking south from Stondon Road. Beyond Chibley (using the road into Shillington at Marquis Hill) you'll find paths



across to Pirton – and beyond that, the Chilterns at Pegsdon.

## 4. Campton and Polehanger Wood

Beyond the village hall, standing at the top of Crackle Hill (the steep path heading north-west out of Meppershall) – head down the hill and onwards to the T-junction with the drive serving Woodhall Farm. Turn right on the driveway, with a field on your left hand. Now turn left to walk on the far side of that field. At the corner of the field, the gateway in the hedge gives access to Campton (to the left, over the River Hit) and Polehanger Wood (to the right, to a second gateway into the wood).


## 5. Shefford and Polehanger Wood

Again atop Crackle Hill – don't go down but turn right, initially with hedge on your right and field on the left, and then vice-versa. Descending all the way down to a wooden fence line, continue through beside the big tree and over the field with Polehanger Farm on the other side, using the line of the path and taking care not to walk on the crop. Through the gate at Polehanger, continue with hedge and ditch on your left hand to find the eastern access point to Polehanger Wood (left) or the underpass at the A507 into Shefford by the River (slightly right).

## 6. Stondon and Henlow Camp

Where Fildyke Road meets Chapel Road, head east through the hedge onto what was once known as 'Cow Lane'. This is a beautiful old track. Continue initially beside Chapel Farm, then beside and between fields and turn right along the rear hedgeline of a large house as you near the A600. Reaching a choice of left / right on the far side of the field, turn left for the A600 at the dog track, or right to rise back up to Upper Stondon and the road to Meppershall.



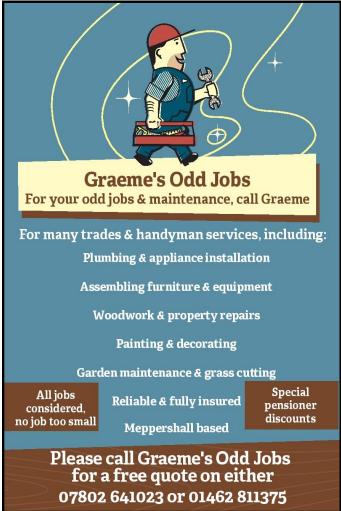

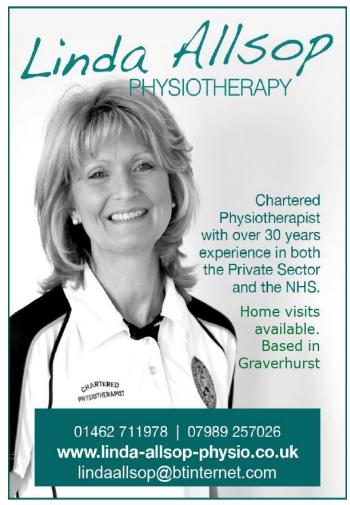
