



Following our Parish Council Meeting I am in complete agreement with some residents suggestions for a 20mph speed limit for Coneygate/ Gregory Close.

The best way forward would be to make the total length of the High Street signed as a 20 mph section of road. This has the advantage that all roads coming off the High Street (Coneygate/Gregory Close etc.) would also have to be included in the 20mph scheme. I will also pursue speed reduction methods on Shillington Road as I am also very concerned about this dangerous section of road especially for pedestrians.

I am putting an article in this edition of the Meppershall Messenger about the advantages of having 20mph schemes within the village in the hope of raising enough interest by residents in order to pursue the scheme with Central Beds Traffic department.

I believe there may already be a petition started in the village regarding speeding village but I am not sure who has started the petition.

Unfortunately due to Covid 19 Speed watch members have not been allowed to carry out regular speed checks in the area which has not helped matters. In the meantime I will start investigating the proposal for a 20mph scheme but from experience this can take many months to come to fruition .



Making our village roads safer

In the next few weeks HML the local maintenance company of Croudace Homes Ltd and with the permission of Central Beds Council will be installing 20mph signage within the Orchard estate of Walnut Tree Way and associated roads. The village hall and pre-school will hopefully benefit as will the residents of the Orchard Estate. Should other areas of the village have concerns about speeding traffic contact should be made with traffic department of Central Beds Council. 20mph Zones and Speed Limits



In 2018, 806 people were killed, 17,839 were seriously injured and 98,000 were slightly injured in reported road collisions on built up roads in Great Britain. A large proportion of these accidents occurred on residential roads, with 108 deaths on B roads in built-up areas and 316 deaths on other minor roads in built-up areas.

Speed significantly increases the chance of being injured in a collision. Research has shown that the risk of death for pedestrians struck by cars increases at higher impact speeds, although exact risk levels varied between studies.

One of the first studies of pedestrian injury and car impact speed found that at 20mph there was a 2.5% chance of being fatally injured, compared to a 20% chance at 30mph, although this study is now regarded as having overestimated the risks. A recent review identified the studies which had produced the most reliable modern estimates.

As well as road safety benefits, it is important to highlight the contribution that 20mph zones can have in improving air quality, reducing noise pollution and encouraging more physical activity, such as walking and cycling, by contributing towards a safer environment. The money spent on the schemes can also greatly improve the residential area.

A recent study calculated casualty rates and the effects of vehicles on air pollution in 30mph zones in Wales. The researchers then estimated the casualty rate and the impacts of vehicles on air pollution in 20mph speed limit areas.

Evidence from the study suggested that a default speed limit of 20mph would substantially reduce road traffic casualties, and at worst would not lead to a direct change in air pollution. However, indirectly, if reduced traffic speeds encourage

people to switch to active modes of travel, such as cycling and walking, there are likely to be greater reductions in air pollution. The study concluded that health and costs savings are likely to be substantial, and the costs of implementing 20mph limits are likely to be far lower than the benefits reduced speeds bring.







Changes to London Luton Airport Flightpaths

A consultation has been launched by London Luton Airport for plans to change arrival flight routes. You can read more information on the link below. The information covers flights landing from the west (towards the east = "easterly") as well as flights landing from the east (towards the west = westerly).

In each case "Option 1" disperses aircraft over a wider area and "Option 2" directs aircraft over narrow corridors. For Meppershall, it is the EASTERLY approach that we need to really think about. The proposal means aircraft will fly south from a new "stack" or holding zone near Huntingdon and approach LTN by flying south to Wrestlingworth/Dunton and then, apparently, straight over Meppershall before turning onto their final approach out near Aylesbury/Tring.

Don't panic, we see aircraft on that kind of route already, today. But we could expect the new plans to send more aircraft that way much more of the time - especially in Option 2. There could be a constant stream of aircraft at busy times, and - overall - the easterly approach to LTN is used 30% of the time (so on average that's about 10 days every month).



Option 1 would spread the aircraft out more. What do you think about these proposals? Go ahead and click the link and tell them your thoughts, and comment below if you like too.

There is some good news. The proposal for the westerly approach doesn't seem to come so near us - and that's the route used 70% of the time.

Message from St Mary's

First of all I would like to say thank you so much to you all for your harvest gifts which are now being taken to the Need Project. Please remember that although we celebrate harvest only once a year – but the need is an all year round need!

November is here, now and our season of remembering.

Sadly, it is not possible for us to hold our usual Service of Special Memories this year. However, the Church will be open for personal prayer on the 4th November and on this day we will remember by name those whose funerals we have been privileged to conduct in the past year. We are inviting their families and friends to come to light a candle and spend a quiet moment with God and their memories in the Church. It is an opportunity open to all.

Remembrance Sunday (8th) will look different this year too. These COVID times do not allow us to gather for our usual Service of Remembrance at the War Memorial. The online morning service on our Facebook page at 10.30am on that day will be a Service of Remembrance; please join us online.

A Century of Remembrance

This year's National Act of Remembrance at the London Cenotaph on Whitehall will not be accompanied by the usual parades nor the attendance of both serving military personnel, veterans and members of public. Yet it is a very significant anniversary.

It is 100 years since a two-minute silence was observed throughout the country, marking the funeral of the Unknown Soldier, at that very spot.

While there was spontaneous jubilation in November 1918 at the end of the Great War itself, followed by a royal feast in November 1919 to mark the first anniversary, it was the sombre reflection of the 1920 Remembrance that defined the way we

commemorate the Armistice and Remembrance Sunday right up to today, a century later. It was a profound and moving moment in world history.

As the nation continued to grieve the unspeakable losses of the first world war, the funeral of the unknown soldier resonated deeply and perhaps permanently with the country. During the war, a chaplain had seen a simple wooden cross hurriedly assembled in the mud to mark the resting place of a fallen soldier on the battlefields. Knowing how many had fallen in that way, when the war had finished the chaplain insisted that one "unknown soldier" should be brought home from the battlefield mud and buried alongside royalty in Westminster Abbey with all the honour of the nation's greatest leaders and heroes. That one burial was to be a symbol for hundreds of thousands of lost soldiers from across what was then The British Empire.

On 7th November 1920, four such unknown soldiers were brought to a chapel near Arras in France and one was brought to the castle at Boulogne on the following day, under guard, where it was watched over in an overnight vigil mounted by the prestigious French 8th Infantry Regiment. Undertakers transferred the remains to a casket made of oak from Hampton Court Palace. A medieval crusader's sword was laid on top of the casket with a shield fixed to it, inscribed with the words "A British Warrior who fell in the Great War 1914–1918 for King and Country". The sword had been personally chosen by King George V.

On 9th November 1920, that unknown soldier was transported to the waiting HMS Verdun with full military honours, its route lined by 1,000 French children and its passing marked by French cavalry trumpets and infantry bugles. It crossed the channel escorted by six battleships and as it approached the English coast a 19-gun salute was fired from Dover Castle. On 10th November it was taken by train to London Victoria railway station.

On the morning of 11th November 1920, the casket was laid on a Royal Horse Artillery gun carriage and drawn by horses from the station through huge and utterly silent crowds. Its arrival at Whitehall was marked by the unveiling of The Cenotaph – the national memorial – by King George V. The King and Royal Family then followed the casket on its final journey to be laid to rest in Westminster Abbey, watched over by a guard of honour comprising 100 recipients of the Victoria Cross – our country's rarest and highest honour. The ceremony at Westminster Abbey also had 100 special guests: all of them women who had lost their husband and sons in the war.

This year in Meppershall, just as at The Cenotaph, normal attendance is not possible for Remembrance. But let's make sure that we remember those events of 100 years ago and reflect on that unknown soldier. They are a symbol of the quiet dedication of so many who serve our nation, in the name of the peace and security from which we all benefit. For every name on our own memorials and others in more distant places, at the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will remember them.

Story of a Pilgrimage: Harlington

It seems that the ancient practice of Pilgrimage is enjoying a resurgence. The people of England used to be a pilgrimaging people until the dissolution of the monasteries under King Henry VIII - the land was criss-crossed with ancient walking routes we still use today like the Icknield Way to sites such as Canterbury and St Albans. You may have heard of the Camino de Santiago route in Spain. In the 1980's a few hundred pilgrims a year walked it - now there are half a million - many of them young people searching spiritually.

I have been walking the John Bunyan Trail in 'micro' pilgrimages of one day, or overnight trips, since last year. This year I found myself on the stretch from Streatley to Harlington. I'm ashamed to say I called on the off-chance at very short notice to ask if I could 'champ' (church camp). Champing, as a practice of hospitality, is where a church kindly lets pilgrims sleep on the floor somewhere, or in the churchyard by way of accommodation, and the pilgrims can get their dinner at a local hostelry. Thankfully permission was granted for my 'wild camp' in the churchyard and I chose the branch of an ancient Yew to hitch up the basha under which to sleep. It was the



night of Tuesday 1 September, by happenstance the feast day of St Giles of Provence. Wikipedia tells me 'Giles founded the abbey in Saint-Gilles-du-Gard whose tomb became a place of pilgrimage. It was a stop on the road that led from Arles to Santiago de Compostela, the pilgrim Way of St. James.' Such 'Godincidences' as I like to call them, happen when you pilgrimage.

Why become a pilgrim, putting yourself through the effort and sometimes hardship? There's a deep human urge to set out on journeys, of discovery, to visit sacred sites like churches, cathedrals, ancient monuments, beauty spots, healing springs of water, and great trees. It's a chance to slow down to the pace of a walking rhythm (if you're walking), to get away from distractions and even listen to the God who we find is speaking to us already - when we listen. Jesus himself invited his followers '...because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.' Mark 6:31 Pilgrimage then, is sabbath-time.

What did I learn? He teaches us about life when we're on pilgrimage:

- that the interior journey often mirrors the exterior journey; sometimes my pace is too fast to 'just be' and reflect on life and God I need to build in dedicated times or they may just not happen. Enjoy the journey, savour it's giftedness, rather than rush to the destination as some sort of 'achievement'.
- that John Bunyan's life and his amazing novel Pilgrim's Progress inspire me...

How courageous of him in November 1660 to not swerve from his calling to preach at Lower Samsell farm by Harlington. He was warned that a warrant was out for his arrest. Deciding to continue, he was arrested and brought before the local magistrate Sir Francis Wingate at Harlington House, followed by 12 years in Bedford gaol.



His dear wife was pregnant at the time and later gave birth to a still-born baby. In our times Bunyan is honoured in St Mary's Harlington church - there's been a kind of reconciliation or vindication in the church that once persecuted him - symbolised by the thick branch of the famous Bunyan's Oak now supporting a beautiful wooden altar table. There's even a stained glass window for him.



- humility and dependence on others. Thirsty, I had to stop and knock on a door to ask for water. The householder kindly showed me the tap and trustingly left me to myself to drink. The kindness of strangers.
- enjoying the simple pleasures of creation (I like to call it that, rather than 'nature'). Plucking sweet and bitter blackberries from hedgerows. Boiling up a cup of tea on my woodstove to the scent of wood smoke. Innocent farm animals staring at me wide-eyed in curiosity. Looking out in wonderment from under my basha and seeing the stars in the vast dark sky above the church.
- circling the church in an evening prayer-walk and wondering if, (maybe sensing?) the presence of angels on the battlements, strong, 'other', and reassuring.
- a delightful morning surprise; the ingenuity and cheerful, sheer, *carrying on-ness* of the folk outside in the sunshine, gathering for Morning Prayer undeterred by COVID-19. An unexpected gift the opportunity to view the beauty of the church interior.

And a dream to end with; that one day, there might be our own little version of the 'Way of St James, Santiago de Compostella' on our own patch of this beautiful earth in Bedfordshire. This would be that the John Bunyan Trail might become a contemporary Pilgrim Way along ancient footpaths trod by our ancestors, and John Bunyan himself. A path affordable by anyone, not just those who have cash to travel, for young and old, believers and seekers. A pilgrim Way of wholeness/holiness, healing and restoration, doable because local, supported by hospitable churches, unseen Prayer, and people of generosity and good will along the route. The Bunyan Trail passes right through Meppershall and its route goes north through Shefford, Haynes and Elstow to Bedford. A 77 mile loop in total, south of Meppershall it heads through Shillington, Hexton and Barton before heading through the Chilterns to Sundon and then turning north back to Bedford in its western loop.



Financial Matters by Paul Savuto

Titanic disaster led to historic life insurance payouts

When the 'unsinkable' Titanic hit an iceberg and sank in 1912, life and accident insurance companies lost \$3,464,111, according to a contemporary article published in The Shore Press. The accident led to some of the largest insurance payouts ever, with the beneficiaries of business magnate John B. Thayer receiving a total accident insurance payout of \$120,000 (equivalent to around \$3.2m today) from insurance firm Travelers and his widow on the receiving end of a \$50,000 life insurance payout (around \$1.3m today). According to another article from 1912, Herbert F. Chaffee of North Dakota held the largest life insurance policy of all those who perished, with his beneficiaries receiving a staggering \$146,750 (around \$3.9m today)!

No less relevant today - The Titanic may have been considered as a once-in-a-lifetime disaster, but recent events show us that life insurance is every bit as important in 2020 as it was in 1912. The coronavirus pandemic has led to the tragic loss of over 40,000 lives in the UK alone, with many grieving families left financially devasted.
