#### **Editorial by Mick Ridley and James Read**

Government at the national level and more locally can often seem to be in turmoil. As a country, what some of us may want is very different to what some of the rest of us may want. Brexit has brought us a Super Saturday but things are far from clear and our relationship with Europe will continue to dominate the news for years to come.



The future of Central Bedfordshire can sometimes seem to be equally uncertain. Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) has been working on its Local Plan and it was reviewed by national planning inspectors in recent months. The plan is important because it is the proof that CBC is fulfilling its obligations to allow for new housing. It was the absence of an approved CBC plan that turned the decision on the Gladman development in Meppershall (140 unexpected houses backing on to Nuns Wood).

The national planning inspector's letter dated 30 September casts doubt over the acceptability of the CBC plan as drafted. It is critical of a proposed area of development north of Luton, which would encroach on the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and on the Green Belt at Sundon. It is critical of the proposed building on Green Belt at Harlington and other villages. It is critical of the proposed 5,000 homes at Marston Vale stating that "its appearance would be harmful to one of the defining landscape characteristics of the area" — namely the Greensand Ridge. It suggests that the proposed amount of growth in Arlesey is too much. But it also suggests that the redevelopment of RAF Henlow is drawn into a fresh consultation with the local community, implying that more new build in that location should be added to the CBC Local Plan. This would bring a new threat of very large-scale development on Meppershall's doorstep. It makes our continued village identity all the more crucial.

In this time of uncertainty and worries about the future, it is nice to take a step back and enjoy the certainties of our village life. This issue of *The Meppershall Messenger* includes a celebration-in-photos of September's beautiful Scarecrow Festival. The winner, Roger's Bakery, is shown on the cover and all the colour of the many entries is displayed in a special pull-out supplement. What a great Meppershall moment.

November is of course the month when We Will Remember Them and many will come to St Mary's churchyard, to the war memorial, for the Act of Remembrance at 10.45am on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> November. These moments in the village year bring us together as one. Current uncertainties are small when we humbly compare them with the commitment and sacrifice of past and current servicemen and women. All are welcome.

And one last piece of certainty is Santa's Float, all ready to tour the village in the runup to Christmas on December 15<sup>th</sup> (Shefford end) and 16<sup>th</sup> (High Street end). Make a note in your calendar to be home and give him a warm welcome. There are some things you can always rely on.

#### **Garden Waste Collections – Important Dates**

Central Bedfordshire Council has confirmed that the usual winter suspension of garden waste collection will run as follows:

Last collection: Friday 6<sup>th</sup> December
 First collection of spring: Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> March

For other bin collections, Christmas Day and News Year's Day both fall on our regular collection day of Wednesday and Central Beds says the revised collection days will be:

- Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> December (instead of Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup>)
- Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> January (instead of Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> January)

#### **Central Bedfordshire Council Launches New Community Grants**

CBC is now advertising for ideas and proposals that could benefit from its new £700k investment in new grant schemes in our region. The aim is to help local groups meet the needs of their communities.

Applications for the Ward Councillor Grant Scheme can be initially discussed via our councillors – and applications can be made online via <a href="https://example.com/bit.ly/cbc/wardGrant">bit.ly/cbc/wardGrant</a>:

The idea is to explore how relatively small amounts of grant funding could make a big difference to local groups across cultural, environmental, sporting or social projects. Groups need to raise some money independently – and if they are successful when they apply to CBC, the grant will match what they have raised.

Each Central Bedfordshire Councillor has access to £2,000 - the number of grants issued is up to them and councillors can combine their funds if needed.

A second scheme launching soon – the Community Assets Grant Scheme – allows groups to apply for up to £25k for capital projects such as building work or more expensive items such as defibrillators or lights.

Across these schemes, the focus is on community benefit and our councillors are keen to hear your ideas. Perhaps there is something you know the community needs, something that needs a bit of funding to get it going? This scheme could be for you. #### Parish Council – Leisure Facilities Update

Over the last few months the parish council has received many questions about village leisure facilities, we hope this article answers those questions.

- What will the field behind the village hall be called and why? In 2018 the
  Foster family asked us to find an alternative to the name Fosters Field. As 2018
  marked 100 years since the end of the First World War, the name Centenary
  Field was chosen.
- When will Centenary Field be available for use by residents? Once Croudace Homes have completed their contractual obligations the land will be transferred to the parish council who have appropriate insurance cover and will open it up for use. We hope that this will be before the end of the year.
- Why has it taken so long to have the facilities open to the public? Centenary
  Field was the last area to be developed by Croudace Homes as it was where
  they had their material compound. When they moved off site a lot of work was
  required and there are still works that need to be completed e.g. fencing,
  installation of bins, seats, standpipes, dropping of kerbs, inspection of facilities
  etc.
- What facilities will there be on Centenary Field? At handover there will be a toddler play area, a junior play area, the MUGA, a fenced no dogs allowed football pitch, seating, bins and area set aside for future use as a cemetery. And the rest of the field of course.
- Who will be able to use the football pitch? We have been talking with a local football club who wish to use the pitch for club games during the football season. This may help us offset some of the maintenance costs, but obviously we want the area to be available for use by all our residents, (but not our fourlegged friends!).
- Is there anymore play equipment to be installed on Centenary Field by Croudace? No. Croudace have installed circa £66,000 of new play equipment and reinstalled any equipment that could be re-used from Fosters Field. They have also helped to make areas future proof e.g.: bigger toddler play area so that we can add in new items and have agreed to leave fencing around the football pitch at a cost of circa £10,000.
- What's the wooden PC Storage building used for? Croudace Homes have provided us FOC with the wooden PC storage building that sits to the right of the village hall. It's a place where we can store things such as our litter pick equipment, spare goal nets, spare bin liners etc. It has been vandalised on several occasions so is currently empty until we can organise a repair that will last.
- Will the parish council be installing any new play equipment in the village?
   Yes. We will have access in the next financial year to money provided by other housing developments in the village that can be used to install new play

- facilities. We hope next year to involve children from the village in our choice of items to install.
- Will you be removing the play equipment from Old Road Meadow when Centenary Field is opened? No, but we may add to the play area at Old Road Meadow as some developers have provided funds specifically for this location.
- Have you any other plans for Old Road Meadow? Yes, we need to repaint the
  picnic table as it has been vandalised and will be installing another picnic table
  in the area. We will also be completing some maintenance work on trees and
  installing new signage.
- I've heard rumours about an outdoor gym, what's that about? A developer has recently provided £28,000 specifically to provide an outdoor gym. We have plans to install this on Centenary Field behind the football pitch in the next financial year.
- Will you be making any improvements to the allotments? Yes. We have secured funds to install security fencing, replace the water lines and provide an ECO toilet.
- When will the cemetery be open for use? At present there are no plans to open a cemetery on Centenary Field as the village church cemetery and other local facilities have capacity. The parish council has however an obligation to plan for future village needs.



#### Still got a query?

We welcome your questions, comments and concerns. If you can't make a parish council meeting which is usually held on the second Monday of the month to speak to us, please email the Parish Clerk, Alessandra, on <a href="mailto:clerk@meppershall.org">clerk@meppershall.org</a> and she will endeavour to help or forward your request to councillors for a response.

#### **Neighbourhood Watch Scheme**

We now have in place a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme which covers properties in Walnut Tree Way, Harriots Field and Banland Croft.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Pete, a near neighbour, for helping me put up the Neighbourhood Watch signage and **Croudace Homes.co.uk** for funding the purchase of the said signs.

Living within a Neighbourhood Watch area reduces the likelihood of being a burglary victim. Households living in a Neighbourhood Watch area experience 21% fewer burglaries than similar households. Being a victim of burglary also raises yours, and your neighbours' risk of being burgled again.

The Home Secretary has put a Modern Crime Prevention Strategy at the top of the policing agenda and the Neighbourhood Watch scheme is in support of this objective. Crime is changing and, within the Neighbourhood Watch (Members' Guide), more varied advice is given about how to prevent the new challenges facing our communities, (see the Cyber Crime leaflet with the November Messenger), as well as more basic security measures. The Neighbourhood Watch scheme is free and the joining process is relatively easy. To join, visit **www.ourwatch.org.uk** and then enter your postcode.

We have new members in both Walnut Tree Way and Harriots Field but to-date have no members in Banland Croft. The more members we have, the greater the likelihood of our premises being more secure. By being in a Neighbourhood Watch area, some insurance companies will offer a discount on house insurance. By becoming a member, some security products can be obtained at a discount.

For other residents of Meppershall, have you thought of setting up your own scheme? It is quite easy to set up - once again visit **www.ourwatch.org.uk** and then enter your postcode.

Thank you to those members who have already joined and we hope many more of you will join in the near future.

#### Message from St Mary's

November is here again - and we are again honouring our promise - "We will remember them!"

This year, The Royal British Legion is asking communities across Britain to "Remember Together" the service and sacrifice, friendship and collaboration of the men and women of Britain, the Commonwealth and Allied nations who fought together 75 years ago, particularly in three key battles in 1944 - Monte Cassino, D-Day, and Kohima and Imphal. "We ask the nation to commemorate their contributions to our liberty and Remember Together." The Legion recalls (for more detail see their website):

At Monte Cassino, a 240,000 strong Allied Army with contingents from six continents representing many nations, opened the way to the liberation of Rome. At the time there was a perception that the Allied armies in Italy were "D-Day dodgers, busy sunning themselves" while others were really fighting the war. However, by the time Polish troops had captured the summit of Monte Cassino, the Allied armies there had suffered over 54,000 casualties.

On D-Day thirteen nations collaborated to land 156,000 men in Normandy. The D-Day landings included over 5,000 vessels and ships, nearly 11,000 aeroplanes - 23,400 Allied paratroopers - and over 130,000 ground troops. By the end of D-Day Allied forces had suffered nearly 10,000 casualties, of which 4,000 were fatalities. The sacrifice and courage of those who played their part in D-Day secured a foothold on mainland Europe from which the Allies were able to go on to liberate Western Europe.

At Kohima and Imphal one of the most ethnically diverse Armies in history came together to win "one of the most remarkable victories" of the war. In 1943, General William Slim took command of what would become the 14th Army – a collected force of British, pre-partition Indian, Gurkha, and African troops (from 9 different African nations!)

The forces at Kohima endured some of the worst close quarters fighting of the Second World War but in the end inflicted on the Japanese Imperial Army the worst defeat in its history. They shattered belief in the invincibility of the Japanese and victory after victory followed for the 14th Army.

Each Year on Remembrance Day we read the inscription taken from a cemetery for British soldiers who fell at Kohima:

"When You Go Home, Tell Them Of Us And Say, For Your Tomorrow, We Gave Our Today".

They were dark days - but nations came together - to fight for peace and freedom.

When I look at our war memorial and our single war grave - and knowing what I know - I still have very little concept of the human cost of it all. I have never been to the war cemeteries on the continent, nor seen the rows of white headstones as far as the eye can see or walked where "lads lie slumbering beneath" unmarked - but not forgotten.

Sadly, nations that had fought and died together for peace and freedom were not nearly so able to live together in peace and freedom afterwards - and those we welcomed onto our soil to take bullets in the cause of our freedom too, we were not nearly so ready to welcome into our churches to share worship with us or to live down our streets to share our daily lives! Hopefully, over the years that has changed.

Victory was won because of the contributions of so many individuals, so many nations, offering their gifts and resources - even their lives - in the common cause that was war. And we honour still the men and women who dedicate their lives to guard our peace and freedom - our way of life.

In our time there are many other causes that need the nations to work together - world peace; climate change; pollution of the air, the oceans and the land; the loss of biodiversity and endangered species, the human need for food and clean drinking water; the fight against disease... to name but a few of them.

The truth is that when we all come together and use our skills and talents for good - marvellous things can be achieved. I believe that when we ask God to be a part of our working together - because of God's promises his mercy and his power - we can hope not just for marvellous things, but also miracles along the way.

Wow, how time flies when you are having fun. We have been blackberry picking and then we made blackberry jam tarts. We have been collecting autumnal leaves and playing with them in all areas of our setting inside and out. This included throwing them up in the air in our

Hide and seek has also been a favourite activity recently, with big tyres, the playhouse, and a handmade den to hide in.

'In the Moment Planning' has been a great success this term. Something else we now incorporate into everyday play is 'Scribing'. Scribing is an effective way to engage young children in the writing process. We never tell the children we are going to write or they should try to write, instead we wait for the moment they tell us a story or show an interest in writing, then we offer to scribe their story, list, or description for them in their own words. When a child is motivated to do something, this is when they learn the most especially with our support. They are captivated by seeing us write and hearing us say their own words, and can then later act out their story, or discus something to a group of children with our help at the end of the session, empowering the words on the paper. They often want to illustrate the story or have a go a writing themselves. Every child will have a different motivation and ability, but with our support can enjoy the wonders of writing.

Autumn term is always a little quieter than Spring and Summer term, so the perfect time for a child to start and settle into pre-school. After Christmas our numbers build up and our existing children increase their sessions with us, so if you little one is ready to start a new adventure, please book a visit to see what we have to offer.

#### **Financial Matters by Paul Savuto**

#### How much do you need to retire comfortably?

People on an average salary who wish to retire at the age of 65 will now typically require a pension pot of almost £450,000 in order to fund their retirement until they are 100 years old, recent analysis has found <sup>1</sup>.

#### Never too early to start saving

The research also shows that an individual who starts saving into a pension at 25 years of age will need to invest around £235 a month in order to accumulate a retirement fund of that size. However, a delay of 10 years would see this monthly figure almost double to £428, while someone who only starts saving at the age of 45 would need to set aside £859 a month to attain a pension fund of that size.

This analysis vividly demonstrates the benefit of starting to save for retirement at the earliest opportunity, ideally from the day you first start work.
